What to Expect:

The United States Merchant Marine Academy offers three types of visits: Admissions Brief & Tour, Day Visit, and Overnight Visit. Each provides a distinct opportunity to learn more about Academy life—whether through a concise overview or an immersive stay with Midshipmen. These visits allow prospective candidates to observe the Academy's academic environment, training structure, and commitment to service.

Visit Days:

Day Visits: Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays (10:30AM – 4:00PM)

Overnight Visits: Tuesdays and Thursdays (10:30AM – 12:00PM the following day)

Briefing Only: Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays (10:30AM – 11:30AM)

Visit Types:

Admissions Brief & Campus Tour

A half-day experience that includes an admissions presentation and a guided tour of campus. Ideal for initial exposure to the Academy and its programs.

Day Visit

A structured visit where you'll be paired with a Plebe (first-year Midshipman) for a closer look at daily life. You'll attend class, tour key facilities, eat lunch in Delano Hall, and speak with Midshipmen about academics, Sea Year, and service commitments.

Overnight Visit

An immersive opportunity to stay in the barracks with a Plebe host and experience 24 hours of Academy life. You'll observe morning Plebe muster, attend classes, eat meals in Delano Hall, and take part in daily routines. Depending on the schedule, you may also witness regimental activities, athletic practices, or evening study hours—offering a comprehensive look at the structure and expectations of Kings Point.



Visitation Meal Cost:

Meal costs during your visit will vary depending on the type of visit you select.

- **Day Visit or Lunch-Only Visit:** \$8.00 (includes lunch with the Midshipmen)
 - Overnight Visit: \$24.00 (includes lunch, dinner, and breakfast the following morning)

Payment can be made by **check** (payable to *Blackstone Consulting Inc.* or *BCI*) or **cash**. Please note that **debit** and **credit cards are not accepted** at this time.

Whether you're curious about academics, sea year, military life, or anything in between — ask away! We're excited to share what makes USMMA special.





Midshipman Life Snapshot:

Plebe Year (Fourth Class):

Wake up before dawn for Plebe Muster, and the pace doesn't slowdown from there. You square your corners throughout the day as you navigate demanding STEM classes, regimental obligations, and inspections. You're expected to live by your class rates, maintain your military bearing, and adapt quickly to the high standards of Kings Point. It's challenging, intense, and non-stop — but through it all, you begin to find your footing, your discipline, and your crew.

Third Class Year:

Back on campus with a full academic load, you take on tougher classes like celestial navigation and differential equations, while balancing regimental duties and leadership training. Then, partway through the year, you get your first real taste of life at sea: one trimester aboard ship. You stand watch, learn the ropes, and complete your first sea project — experiencing firsthand what you've been studying.

Second Class Year:

You head back to sea for two full trimesters — this time with greater responsibilities and more challenging sea projects. You put leadership, navigation, and ship operations into action while gaining invaluable hands-on experience. After those two trimesters, you return to campus for your final trimester of academics and regimental leadership duties, preparing to step into a senior role.

First Class Year:

Now you're a senior — a leader of the regiment, mentor to the underclassmen, and prepping for your license exams and future career. The balance is tricky: final classes, regimental duties, service selections, and job interviews all collide. But the finish line is in sight, and every day you carry the weight and pride of being a Kings Pointer. Graduation is more than a ceremony — it's a rite of passage into the maritime profession and beyond.
